## Analysis of changes for 5 years after marriage (according to Newlyweds Statistics)

## 1. Overview

## $\square$ (Characteristics)

In 2019, the newlyweds at first marriage, who resided in the nation and remained married after reporting their marriage 5 years ago, totaled 212 thousand couples.

O Among newlyweds at first marriage, wives born in 1980~1989 occupied 80.3\%. (1980~1984: 36.3\%, 1985~1989: 44.0\%)

O Newlyweds who remained as dual income couples for the past 5 years occupied 25.6\%. Newlyweds who remained as single income couples for the past 5 years occupied 18.5\%.
O Newlyweds not owning a housing unit for the past 5 years occupied $40.7 \%$. Newlyweds owning a housing unit for the past 5 years occupied $28.7 \%$.

$\square$ (Change in child birth, economic activity and house ownership for 5 years)
O Newlyweds with a child in the second year of marriage accounted for $55.9 \%$. This figure reached $82.5 \%$ in the fifth year of marriage.

O In the first year of marriage, the share of dual income couples ( $51.6 \%$ ) was higher than that of single income couples. This share of dual income couples showed a drop until the third year of marriage. In the fourth year of marriage, this share turned into a rise, recording $46.6 \%$ in the fifth year of marriage.

O The share of newlyweds owning a housing unit showed an increase as time went by, reaching $53.9 \%$ in the fifth year of marriage.


## 2. Demography of newlyweds by wife's birth year

O The share of wives with a child in the fifth year of marriage, who were born in $1980 \sim 1984$, stood at $83.5 \%$. Their average number of children stood at 1.16 persons. The share of wives with a child in the fifth year of marriage, who were born in 1985~1989, stood at $84.6 \%$. Their average number of children stood at 1.19 persons.

O The share of economically active wives, who were born in 1980~1989, recorded the highest figure of $53.7 \%$.

O The share of economically active wives, who were born in 1980~1989, recorded the highest figure in the first year of marriage. Throughout 5 years' marriage, the share of economically active wives was higher than the share of economically inactive wives.


O The share of wives with a child, who were born in 1980~1989, exceeded $50 \%$ in the second year of marriage. The share of wives (58.4\%) with a child, who were born in 1980~1984, was $5.5 \%$ p higher than that of wives ( $52.9 \%$ ) with a child, who were born in 1985~1989.

## 3. Demography of newlyweds according to the change in economic

 activityO Couples ( $86.4 \%$ ) who remained as dual income couples for the past 5 years showed a higher share of couples with a child than those (82.3\%) who remained as single income couples for the past 5 years.

O Regardless of newlyweds who remained as dual income couples or single income couples for the past 5 years, the share of newlyweds with a child in the second year of marriage exceeded $50 \%$. The share of newlyweds, who remained as single income couples for 5 years, with a child in the second year of marriage (64.7\%) was $14.3 \%$ p higher than that of newlyweds, who remained as dual income couples for 5 years, with a child in the second year of marriage (50.4\%).


## 4. Demography of newlyweds according to the change in child birth and house ownership

O (Child birth and change in wife's economic activity)
As for wife's economic activity of couples without a child, the share of economically active wives was higher than that of economically inactive wives.

- As for wife's economic activity of couples with a child, the share of economically active wives in the first year of marriage stood at $57.0 \%$. This share fell to $47.9 \%$ in the third year of marriage. In the meantime, this share rose to $50.9 \%$ in the fifth year of marriage.

O (House ownership and change in child birth)
The share of couples with a child ( $82.9 \%$ ), who owned a housing unit for 5 years, was higher than that of couples with a child ( $80.7 \%$ ), who didn't own a housing unit for 5 years.
